Sticky Knowledge

- ◆ The Americas are two separate continents consisting of North America and South America.
- North America contains 23 countries with the largest being Canada.
- ♦ The largest city is Mexico City with 9 million people living there Before the Europeans arrived, the indigenous and native Americans lived in the continent.
- ◆ North America has a continental climate. This means the climate is generally dry, with cold winters and hot summers, but with large variation which is expected due to its size.
- North America covers all the major biomes of aquatic, grassland, forest, desert and tundra.
- ◆ Latitude and longitude are a system of lines used to describe the location of any place on Earth. Lines of latitude run in an east-west direction across Earth. Lines of longitude run in a north-south direction.

Vocabulary	
Latitude	A measurement of distance from the equator (North or South).
Longitude	A measurement of how far east or west it is.
Southern hemi- sphere	The half of the earth that lies south of the equator.
Northern hemi- sphere	The half of the earth that lies north of the equator.
Biomes	a large area characterized by its vegetation, soil, climate, and wild- life.
Time zone	An area on Earth that has a specific time that all citizens can set their clocks to.
Climate	The average measurements of temperature, wind, humidity, snow and rain in a place over the course of years.
Population	The amount of people who live in one area or country.
