Sticky Knowledge

- Trade is the buying and selling of goods and services we want and need.
- Trade involves the exchange of goods or services in return for other goods or services or money.
- El Salvador is located between the equator and the Tropic of Cancer.
- Goods imported from El Salvador include coffee, cotton, sugar, shrimp, fruit and nuts.
- Fair trade is trade between companies in developed countries and producers in developing countries in which fair prices are paid to the producers.
- Some of the goods the UK exports are: scrap iron, whisky, tartan kilts, medicines, aircraft parts, cars, computers, oil and gas.
- Some of the goods the UK imports are: coffee beans, bananas, medicines, aircraft parts, cars, computers, oil and gas.

Vocabulary

fair Trade	Trade between companies in developed countries and producers in developing countries in which fair prices are paid to the producers.
globalisation	The spread of trade and ideas worldwide.
multinational	Something that operates in more than one country. A multinational business is based in more than one country.
economy	The word used to explain how money is made and spent in a particular area.
global	Around the world.
export	Goods or services made in the UK and sold to another country,
import	Goods or services purchased from one country and brought into the UK.
Tropic of Cancer	imaginary line used to show position on the Earth's surface, above the Equator.
