- Drawing techniques such as hatching, scribbling, stippling, and blending can make patterns and create surface texture

Sticky Knowledge

Three dimensional forms are either organic (natural) or geometric (mathematical shapes, like a cube).

Using different tools or using the same tool in different ways can create different types of lines.

Surface rubbings can be used to add or make patterns.

Shading helps make drawn objects look realistic.

Texture in an artwork can be real (what the surface actually feels like) or a surface can be made to appear textured.

Vocabulary	
Abstract	Art where the subject doesn't necessarily look like it does in real life.
Botanical art	To depict whole plants or parts of plants that is visually pleasing and scientifically accurate.
Composition	Putting different elements together in a pleasing way
Geometric	A regular shape with angles and straight lines
Organic	Irregular natural shapes
Scale	The size of what is being drawn
Shading	Drawing marks to show areas of light and dark
Texture	A surface qualify that is not flat
